


Stakeknife — Pictures




After training, successful FRU candidates would join together in a passing out parade. This picture shows the new recruits in 1981, including Martin Ingram.


Ingram (sitting down) with two other FRU officers on a military exercise at Ballykinlar Army base, County Down, in 1988.

Pat Finucane, the Belfast solicitor murdered at his home in February 1989.




Francisco Notorantonio was sixty-six when he was shot dead by the UDA/UFF at his west Belfast home in October 1987.




Notorantonio's daughter Charlotte wants an inquiry held into his death.




Gerry Adams carries the coffin of Brendan Ruby Davison in 1987, as Freddie Scappaticci (circled) walks behind.

Farmer Tom Oliver, an informer for Garda Special Branch, was murdered by the IRA's internal security unit.





The body of John Dignam lies near a border road shortly after his interrogation and murder by the IRA's internal security unit. A plastic milk


crate was placed on the body, so that security forces would think it was booby trapped.
